We can offer the following commentary in respect of the demographic data set presented above:

- The number of BAME students registered at the University has been rising steadily over the past 3 years, reaching 19.6% of the total student population in 2021/22. This is slightly in advance of other Russell Group institutions (for full-time students) but very marginally below the sector average (20%). The majority of our BAME students are registered on undergraduate courses of study.
- Asian students continue to represent the single largest ethnicity within the profile of BAME students.
- Our gender split continues to show we have a significantly lower proportion of female to male students in comparison to the sector. It may be reasonable to assume that this is in part due to our particular portfolio of subject areas. We have, however, seen a steadily increasing percentage of female students registering at the University over the past 7 years with the proportion now sitting at 40.4% up from 37% in 2014/15.
- As in previous years, our proportion of disabled students continues to run in advance of the sector and the Russell Group. Indeed, we saw a further significant rise between 19/20 and 21/22 (from 15.8% to 18.8%).
- For our undergraduate students, Christianity continues to be the religion most identified with amongst students, although the proportion of students identifying this way continues to decline. Other faith group numbers remain stable. Amongst our postgraduate population just over a quarter of student identify with no religion. This is closely followed with around a fifth of students identifying as Christian. We have seen a significant jump in the proportion of postgraduate students identifying as Hindu. This is likely to be attributable to a shift in the countries of origin of our postgraduate students with a move away from Chinese students and an increased number of Indian students.

3. Attainment

The University has developed a comprehensive Access and Participation Plan. The plan is publicly available on our website.

The statistical analysis carried out as part of the development of the plan identified an awarding gap between White and Black and White and Asian students but did not find statistically significant attainment gaps across other protected characteristics. We have therefore only presented attainment data related to ethnicity in this report. Further details are available in our Access and Participation Plan.


3.1. Commentary

- As the data above demonstrate, there is a significant awarding gap between White and Black students (12.8%) in the most recent year. Interventions have been identified as part of the Access and Participation Plan and our <u>Race Equality Charter Action Plan</u>. In this context we may note a steady reduction in the awarding gap over the past 5 years, from 24.7% to 12.8%. Progress is being made towards the target of 10% in 2024/25.
- There is also a significant awarding gap between White and Asian students. Interventions have been identified as part of the Access and Participation Plan and our Race Equality Charter Action Plan. In this context we may note a reduction in the awarding gap over the past 5 years, from 12% to 4.7% in the most recent year.

4.8. Commentary

ANNEX 3 – Student data

- Over the past 8 years the number of appeals has continued to rise steadily, with a particularly notable spike in 2019.
- In the most recent years (2021 and 2022) there seem to be no anomalies in terms of the genders represented in appeals.
- BAME students continue to be very significantly over-represented (55.5% of appeals against a student population of 18.1%%). However, there was no difference in the proportion of BAME student appeals upheld in comparison to White students. Black students were more likely to have their appeal upheld than White students.
- Disabled students were significantly over-represented in the number of appeals in 2022, making up 26.8% of appeals but only 18.8% of the student population. However, as in previous years appeals from disabled students were more likely to be upheld (53% vs 42%).
