7.	Reasons for the proposal: its purpose and relevance; how it will enhance calibre of teaching and learning; implications for existing programmes and modules in the department (see * below)
	The Department currently offers several small specialist MAs: Creative Writing, Early-Modern Writing, Modern and Contemporary, Performance and Multi-Media Texts, Texts in Performance; of these, only the Drama MA, Performance and Multi-Media Texts, offers Linguistics options, and none allows students to combine modules from our different programmes. At PPR in 2006, it was suggested to us that offering a general MA in English might attract more International PGT applications, especially if a Language component were available, and that it might also be attractive to our existing students. This Proposal is designed to achieve this. All its modules are currently offered on other MA programmes (with the exception of the new semester 2 Discourse as Social Practice); we believe that the new programme would increase the numbers on these modules, but not to an unmanageable level. As indicated above, some minor structural changes to the first semester of our Modern and Contemporary MA are necessary in order to provide maximum flexibility. These plans have already been discussed in outline with PVCT and ADT, and have their approval in principle.
8.	Expected student numbers c. 5 in first year, rising to 12 by year 3.
9.	Staffing implications - adequacy of existing departmental resources; net increase/reduction in staff teaching effort or demands on support staff. At the projected level, implications would be minimal, because all modules currently exist, and relate closely to the research interests of academic staff. Should numbers increase substantially over those projected, a bid to appoint additional academic staff would follow. English and Drama have just received permission to recruit an extra member of support staff (AD3), and this should release some time for our highly qualified Postgraduate Secretary to oversee this programme in addition to others that she administers.

Other resource implications, e.g lecture room, lab and other space requirements; equipment, materials; timetabling constraints (block-teaching for example); any special residential requirements Additional PGT numbers will put an added pressure on our departmental PGT facilities. The East Park Plan includes as an urgent component the provision of more dedicated PG space at this end of the campus, and it is to be hoped that this plan will come to fruition.
13.	Implications for other departments both providing and receiving N/A
14.	Evidence of demand and suitability; views of lecturers; current/prospective students; external examiners/ assessors, professional/industrial bodies etc. The plan was discussed at a meeting of all staff currently involved in MA teaching in the department, and received strong support. Current Part C students have been advised of the possibility of this programme being established, and several have indicated that they would find it more attractive than our current specialist MAs. Most research-led universities run general programmes of this kind in addition to more specialist ones, and their experience would seem to confirm that there is a market here. Our longest-serving current MA External Examiner, Prof. Allan Ingram, has also given the plan his warm support.
15.	Implications for employability We think it likely that a general MA in English would be more easily recognised as a qualification by professional bodies than our current specialist MAs, enhancing the employability of graduates.
16.	Any other relevant information The plan is supported in principle by Howard Jones, Tony Westaway and David Lilley (see emails attached).
