Research highlights

WEDC research is vibrant, supported by an able team of both doctoral researchers and staff. Our ongoing portfolio of activity includes: collaboration with Oxfam on the effects of lighting on gender-based violence and WASH in refugee camps; waste to energy using anaerobic digestion; using nature to manage flood risk in Indonesia; support to the BMGF Shit Flow Diagram initiative; multiple use of water in low-income urban settlements of Kampala; and WASH payment by results in South Asia.

A number of fully-funded PhD studentships are available for high calibre students to commence study with us in October 2018. The deadline for applications is **2nd February 2018**. Check out our website for details.

Innovations in Learning and Teaching

We have a very international MSc cohort in Loughborough this year with our class including students from 10 different countries. The full-time students have also been joined by staff from National Water and Sewerage Corporation (NWSC) Uganda who are pursuing a blended MSc programme. NWSC staff are here studying two modules alongside Loughborough students.

Following a successful pilot in June 2017, we will again teach our *Water Utilities Management* MSc module at NWSC in Uganda between 25th June and 6th July 2018. A limited number of places are open to booking by distance learning students, or those who may wish to pursue the single module as continued professional development.
